Wirrabirra is a connected and future focused community, dedicated to achieving student excellence.

OUR VISION

Our purpose is to make the best interest of the child the primary consideration through inspiring and uniting our school community. A positive, safe supportive school environment is developed through a consistent approach to the teaching of academic and social behaviours.

School Overview

Wirrabirra Primary School is a level 5 Independent Public School situated in the Perth metropolitan area in the suburb of Gosnells. We cater for students in Kindergarten to Year Six. Our school campus has shared facilities with the Education Support Centre and operates an inclusive program for all students. This enables our students to be supported by teacher expertise from the Primary School and Education Support Centre.

The staff of Wirrabirra have a wide range of experience from varied backgrounds in education. All staff undertake regular professional learning on current trends and programs, particular to our school. This staff expertise and experience allows the school to operate specialist programs in Physical Education, Music, LOTE (Indonesian) and Digital Technologies.

In 2024 we will add Indigenous Studies to our list of programs.

Wirrabirra has developed a unique culture that defines the ethos and philosophy of our school and there are a number of programs that demonstrate this;

- In 2023 we focussed the importance of providing solid foundations in Literacy and Numeracy, beginning with our very youngest learners in Kindy and Pre-Primary. We know that we need to make an impact in these years for students to achieve continued progress.
- The teaching staff work in collaborative partnerships and participate in peer observation to strive for excellence in delivering quality teaching and learning programs.
- Wirrabirra has developed a Guaranteed and Viable curriculum based on the Western Australian Curriculum which promotes whole school approaches. To support this Operational Guidelines and a Teaching and Learning Handbook guide the learning programs in our school.
- The school is fully networked for ICT and interactive technologies are well developed with all students engaged in a Digital Technologies program.
- Our whole school approach to discipline is based on the Positive Behaviour Support program with all staff being trained in classroom management and participating in ongoing coaching to maintain consistency. Our PBS processes are designed to be educative, not punitive in nature. This underlies all learning areas. Our school wide Student Expectations have been developed and are taught, modelled, and promoted at every opportunity.
- A social, emotional curriculum program (PAThS Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies) is taught and positively reinforced at all levels. This strongly reinforces students' mental health and wellbeing.
- The school has a strong pastoral care focus supporting students in their learning and interaction with others, supported by a School Chaplain. Students have access to SEASONS (a program for students experiencing loss or grief) and a SAER (Students at Educational Risk) support team. In addition, the parents have access to the Positive Parenting Program and the Child and Parent Centre located at Gosnells PS.
- Environmental education and caring for the environment has a significant role in our learning programs.
- The Arts are promoted through our Music program with choir, instrumental, recorder, ukulele and an ensemble group. SIMS lessons provide additional musical opportunities.
- An emphasis on physical skill development, competition and sportsmanship is promoted through all sports programs.
- A Student Manifesto and Parent Agreement documents are public statements that we believe in, work towards and model.
- The school has an active and supportive Parents and Citizens Association that meets regularly. The P&C oversee the operations of the Clothing Pool. Several sub committees support the school through fundraising. The P&C have made strong commitments to improving our school grounds and educational resources.
- The School Board represents both the Primary and Education Support Centre and is well represented by parents who participate in the development of school planning, policy and future directions.

Wirrabirra Primary operates sixteen teaching and learning areas supported by a Library Resource Centre, Music Room, ICT Learning Hub, Science Room, LOTE Room, two undercover areas and a school kitchen. The school also has a purpose-built Dental Therapy Unit on site.

The school grounds are extensive with a large, grassed oval, two soccer pitches, a football field, two basketball courts and three adventure play areas. All gardens and grounds are fully reticulated, and the buildings are air conditioned, and security fenced.




On-Entry - Reading

Results compared to ICSEA Decile including data from other schools



On Entry - Reading





On-Entry - Reading


Results compared to ICSEA Decile including data from other schools





Cohort: Year 3 WIRRABIRRA PRIMARY SCHOOL


Writing - Proficiency

Cohort: Year 5 WIRRABIRRA PRIMARY SCHOOL


Reading - Proficiency Filters : All Students





NOT ACHIEVED Year 3 & Year 5 Data indicate increases in the % of students in the lowest band.





Attendance Rates

Based on 2023 figures Wirrabirra had an overall attendance rate of 88 %. This compares to the state average of 88.9%. It is important to note, COVID and the associated health and safety protocols placed on schools and the wider community, had a significant impact on student attendance rates in 2023.

Learning Area Report: LITERACY

Talk 4 Writing

In 2023, all new teachers to the school accessed professional development so that all staff would be fully trained in Talk 4 Writing. Then throughout the year, they collaborated in year levels to develop a two-year Talk 4 Writing cycle. A selection of teachers also visited Yanchep Beach PS and took away some useful resources and strategies to use in their classrooms. Teachers met weekly in their Phase of Learning Teams to discuss Talk 4 Writing and plan assessment tasks for their cohorts. A Literacy Committee was established, and they met several times a term to discuss Talk 4 Writing assessments and planning schedules. The committee also discussed the need for whole school gestures and created a template displaying student photos to support.

There has been a noticeable increase in student engagement in the writing process which has been evidenced through the quality and quantity of the written work produced by students.

Heggerty

Two staff members attended Heggerty Professional Development. Following this they presented to staff valuable information about the program. One staff member also opened her classroom up for others to come and observe her conduct a Heggerty lesson. She had several graduates and teachers inexperienced with Heggerty take up the opportunity. Most valuably, she also recorded herself teaching a Heggerty lesson to her class for future training of staff.

Letters & Sounds

We now have two qualified Letters & Sound trainers to support our K-2 staff in this program. One created a Letters & Sounds yearly plan for Kindergarten and Pre-Primary, while the other has created a plan for Year 1 and 2. Letters & Sounds workshops in Phase of Learning Team meetings have been given and resources supplied to support Kindy and Pre-Primary teachers. Teachers have also been invited to observe the teaching of Letters & Sounds and supported in the planning and assessment process. K-2 teachers used the Letters & Sounds tracking booklet to assess student learning and inform report writing. This booklet was placed in students transition folders which will follow them into the next year.

Spelling Mastery

Our Yr 3-6 students participate in Spelling Mastery lessons each morning to build dependable spelling skills through a highly structured direct instruction method that blends Phonemic, Morphemic, and Whole word methods. Spelling Mastery interweaves these 3 approaches according to student's skill development and provides straightforward lessons to help efficiency and effectively teach the skills students need to become proficient readers and writers. Explicit instruction, careful selection of spelling words, and repeated practice help students master each concept and reinforce and retain key information.

Learning Area Report: NUMERACY

We are proud to announce that at the end of 2023 Wirrabirra was awarded the status of Maths Active School - SILVER level, by the Mathematical Association of WA. This acknowledges the school's commitment to teacher development and whole school approaches to Maths over consecutive years.

In the classroom.

The Origo Stepping Stones Program and Dr Paul Swan Milestone and Trajectory documents remain central to the school's Maths program, with assessment at class, year and whole school level continuing. Collegiate support and coaching continued throughout 2023, with the Maths co-ordinator allocating one day to supporting teachers to design and deliver engaging maths lessons in line with whole school approaches. With many newly graduated teachers joining Wirrabirra, this was a key step towards maintaining our established whole school approach to numeracy. All teachers delivered daily warmups, reviews and explicit teaching of maths skills coupled with engaging, hands-on rotations to engage children in learning and applying maths concepts.

Professional Development

All staff participated in online Maths Professional Learning delivered by Dr Paul Swan and facilitated by the Maths Co-ordinator during scheduled staff meetings. The first of these programs was delivered in Term 2 across 4 sessions and equipped staff with knowledge and experience in teaching and assessing Basic Facts Milestones (Addition & Subtraction). Later in the year, in Terms 3 & 4, staff participated in 5 sessions dedicated to implementing a Whole School approach to teaching Place Value – to support previous work in this area. Staff engaged in these hands-on activities and returned to class with greater confidence in teaching and assessing place value, as well as recognising and addressing misconceptions.

Data & Analysis and Intervention

2022 NAPLAN results reported progress in moving students from middle range to above expectation, but an increase in the children achieving below expected level. In response to this, the Maths coordinator undertook professional development in Designing a Whole School Intervention program and then used an internationally recognised diagnostic tool to place year 2 & 4 students requiring intervention into groups for withdrawal. These groups then participated in structured, explicit lessons twice a week for 30mins aimed at closing the gaps in their basic mathematical understanding and improving their basic facts knowledge and skills. The students enjoyed the sessions and engaged enthusiastically with the content, leading to a significant improvement in their overall disposition toward maths – an important ingredient of maths success. Teachers also reported a greater level of engagement and successful outcomes in their regular lessons.

In response to 2023 NAPLAN testing experiences and data, investigations were made into various online testing platforms. It was decided providing students with more experience in performing in online situations would help improve NAPLAN performance, as well as give teachers valuable data and analysis skills to help inform their teaching and learning programs. Consequently, the school will be implementing ACER's PAT digital Assessment platform P- 6 in 2024.

Science

Science has a whole school focus based on Primary Connections and planning from the G&V documents developed to guide teaching for each year level. All years plan on the following three strands for each year level; Science Understanding, Science as a Human Endeavour and Science Inquiry Skills. As per the Year 3 example below each years Science area also includes Environmental Science encompassing: guiding, teaching and learning about animal welfare, recycling and sustainability. A group of student Environmental Monitors administer a range of tasks involving the care of chickens, the school environment, the garden plots, recycling (paper rubbish as well as 10c recyclable drink containers), gaining knowledge and understanding of sustainability and renewable resources. The Environmental Monitors lead, guide and teach others, staff, and students, within the school about the importance of taking care of the environment.

Health and Physical Education

Physical Education at Wirrabirra takes a holistic view to developing our students. Fundamental Movement Skills such as catching, throwing, balance and many more are taught in isolated activities to students from Pre-Primary – Year 2. In Year 3 the introduction of team games is incorporated with a large variety of sports being covered.

Paramount to the skill focus of these lessons are the social skills which are explicitly taught throughout each session. Students are provided with a safe and nurturing environment where there is an are expected and promoted to develop skills of self-challenge, resilience, acceptance of all results, encouraging and supporting others, goal setting, and communicating with team mates to achieve a shared outcome. The explanation, review and ongoing development of these skills link directly with the required life skills to succeed in the world beyond primary school.

Our physical education program also offers leadership programs to selected students through our Faction Leader program. These students are provided with the opportunity to practice their leadership skills, whilst being guided to support the school sports community at Wirrabirra.

Students who show a keen interest and high level of sportsmanship are also offered the opportunity to trial for interschool competition. Wirrabirra enters many teams into our local district carnivals each year, giving students an opportunity to practice both their learned skills and demonstrate sportsmanship at an elevated level.





Languages (LOTE)

The Indonesian language program (KETAWA) enables our students to communicate proficiently in a language other than English. It provides students with essential communication skills in the Indonesian language, an intercultural capability and an understanding of the role of language and culture in human communication with our northern neighbours.

Students from Years 3 – 6 attend weekly LOTE lessons in a visually stimulating work environment located within a designated classroom, featuring

Indonesian environmental print and geographical aspects of the Indonesian Island archipelago.

All LOTE lessons were delivered consistent with the Wirrabirra Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum. LOTE Daily Reviews consolidated recall of basic vocabulary, greetings, common phrases and the monetary system in the Indonesian language, taught during the year.

Daily Reviews also provided valuable opportunities to consolidate learning by providing inclusive assistance for students with learning difficulties.

Opportunities were provided for all students to sample the local Indonesian fruit delicacies, rambutan and mangosteen, imported by local Asian fruit markets.

Regular student assessments are conducted using SCSA judging standards. Student achievement is reported to parents at the end of each semester using letter grades and achievement descriptors.



Our Digital Technologies program continued as a specialist area to support class teachers with the integration of ICT in all learning areas as a tool for research, presentation of work and to access additional learning either independently or as a group. Miss Hoogenboom and Ms Tennent led students through a scope and sequence of skills, concepts and understanding. This built on prior learning and supported students in the application of technology skills across the curriculum.

In addition, all students were instructed in responsible use of the internet and cyber safety. This is an ongoing task to ensure our students stay safe when using the internet and its applications both at school and away from school.

Students further developed their skills with Microsoft Office programs. This provided opportunities to integrate digital technology skills with other learning areas. Students had increased access to

iPads and laptops and were able to not only present work with the use of windows applications, they could also use a number of apps for self-paced learning and group projects. Students continued developing and improving their typing skills and efficiency when on devices. This assisted students in their preparation for NAPLAN testing which was conducted predominantly online. Our Whizz Kids continued to have a role in managing equipment and mentoring others in the use and application of technology as part of their student leadership. Also, as part of their leadership development our Whizz Kids attended an excursion to SciTech where they explored a variety of interactive displays using technology.



The Arts

The Arts curriculum has two areas of focus at Wirrabirra with Visual Arts being managed by class teachers and the Music Program coordinated by Mrs Connolly. Our visual arts teaching explores art ideas, skill development, arts processes and the appreciation of art in society. Teachers used a wide range of mediums with learning opportunities to develop student skills and techniques.

Musical teaching explored improvising ways to represent ideas, skill development, performing and the appreciation of music in society. Teaching focussed on practical application of learned skills through musical games, singing and instrumental activities. Mrs Connolly operated a specialist program and all classes received weekly tuition to develop their knowledge and practical instrument skills. This was complemented by students being given the opportunity to participate in Choir and Instrumental Ensembles. Students in Years 4 to 6 participated in weekly choir sessions to develop singing and performing skills.

Wirrabirra students in Years 3 and 4 extended their skills by participating in Junior Ensemble, a program for extension on descant recorders complemented by the inclusion of the ukulele, keyboards and drums. Some students in Years 5 and 6 accessed the Instrumental Music School Services (IMSS) and received tuition in classical guitar, clarinet, flute and brass instruments. This was done through an identification process and weekly visits from specialist teachers. It was complemented by Mrs Connolly running a Senior Ensemble with all IMSS students.

A highlight of the music program was our student's participation in the 'One Big Voice' concert held in the RAC Arena. It was a wonderful experience for all involved.





National Quality Standards

The Kindergarten to Year 2 outdoor play area operates by a weekly Outdoor Program catering for the students physical, social and cognitive development.

The NQS Coordinator emails the program, and a meeting is held once a term with staff to communicate any current information to ensure the smooth running of the program. Activities include obstacle courses, sports games, ball skills, sandpit equipment, art and craft activities and many other learning opportunities for students to engage in during break times. Students and staff members are involved in the set-up, engagement and packing away of equipment. A NQS duty teacher runs a specialised activity during break times to engage students with equipment and activities in a structured way.

Resources for the program are regularly updated with the new edition in 2023 of a wooden play car located in the kindergarten play area, an orbital and nest swing in the pre-primary sand pit, new large games including connect 4 plus the delivery of new sand to all sandpits. The coordination of the installation of 2 trampolines begun in 2023 as another extra edition to the K-2 outdoor program. Student from the upper primary years volunteered their time on a roster system throughout the year to assist the co-ordination of activities.

The Education Assistants participated in professional learning on nature play, which they shared with teaching staff, these strategies have also been incorporated into the program.

The NQS Outdoor Program is a successful part of the learning and engagement of students in the outdoor environment at Wirrabirra Primary School and will continue to evolve with ECE staff professional learning, collaboration and teamwork.

Students At Educational Risk - The SAER Process

The SAER team consists of the Principal, Learning Support Co-ordinator, School Psychologist and Deputy Principals' who work as a team to follow a set process to cater for and meet the needs of students who are identified at educational risk.

If the classroom teacher has concerns regarding a students' behaviour and or academic learning, they are required to complete an online SAER form this is forwarded onto the SAER team. Once a week the team meets to implement a case management triage approach for each student. Decisions are made based on teacher information to what future actions are required which can include one or more of the following: Classroom observations; Continue monitoring with support strategies; Case management meeting with the SAER Team, classroom teacher and parents; Recommendations made to outside organisations including GP, Child Development Center, Child Health Nurse, Indigenous Services or private services if required.

The student's case is allocated to and managed by one of the SAER team members to follow up on agreed actions and collaborate with involved parties. Teachers are supported to develop a Special Education Need Plan to implement in the classroom setting.

If further support is required SSEN D are contacted to work with the school to support the student. Disability Resource Allocation can also be accessed so Special Need Education Assistant time can be provided to support the student and teacher within the classroom setting. Cases are monitored throughout the year and reviewed at the beginning of each school year.


